Hypothesis of the study

H0: Part-time employment will have no impact on the academic performance of college students in Navi Mumbai.

H1: Part-time employment will have significant impact on the academic performance of college students in Navi Mumbai.

Research methodology:

Sample Selected:

The sample of the study covers the College students of Navi Mumbai who are currently enrolled in various fields of study.

Sampling Method:

A simple random sampling method is used for collecting Primary data.

Sample Size:

For collecting Primary data, a total of 123 samples of students from Navi Mumbai were selected.

Research Design:

This study will utilise a mixed-methods approach, combining quantitative and qualitative research

methods to gain a comprehensive understanding of the impact of part-time employment on college students in Navi Mumbai.

Data Collection:

Quantitative Data:

A structured questionnaire is administered to collect quantitative data.

The questionnaire was distributed both electronically and in print.


Data collection is done over a specified period to ensure a sufficient response rate.

Out of total responses collected from undergraduate students about 68% of students are unemployed and 20% are pursuing their internship and rest 2% are engaged in other avenues.


2. How many hours per week do you typically work in your part-time job?

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
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Interpretation:

As per the above study 20% students are pursuing their internships of which 11.6% are working for 20 hours a week and rest 10.7% are working for 30 hours a week.


3. Has your GPA changed since you began working part-time




Interpretation:

4. On a scale of 1 to 5, where 1 is "Not at all financially stable" and 5 is "Very financially stable," how would you rate your current financial stability?




5. Do you rely on income from your part-time job to cover college-related expenses (e.g., tuition, books, accommodation, etc.)?


6. Have you taken out student loans to finance your education

7. How do you perceive the stress levels associated with balancing part-time work and academics?





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


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Interpretation:

About 67.8% students had moderate stress with balancing part-time work and academics.


8. Do you believe that college institutions should provide additional support for students who work part-time?

Hypothesis Testing:

Hypothesis 1

H0: Part-time employment will have no impact on the academic performance of college students in Navi Mumbai.

H1: Part-time employment will have significant impact on the academic performance of college students in Navi Mumbai.

Hypothesis was tested by using percentage method.

From the data gathered, 42.3% of students reported no change in GPA, while 28.5% indicated an improvement, and 29.3% experienced a decline since starting part-time work. These percentages suggest a varied impact on academic performance due to parttime employment among college students in Navi Mumbai.

This shows that the null hypothesis is rejected and the alternate hypothesis is accepted.

Finding:

- 1 .Employment Status: 68% of undergraduate students are unemployed, while 20% are engaged in internships and 2% in other avenues.
- 2. Work Hours: Among students in internships, 11.6% work 20 hours per week, while 10.7% work 30 hours per week.
- 3. GPA Changes: 42.3% reported no change in GPA since beginning part-time work, 28.5% reported improvement, and 29.3% reported a decline.
- 4. Financial Stability Rating: The scale ranged from "Not at all financially stable" to "Very financially stable," but the specific distribution isn't provided.
- 5. Dependency on Income: 71.9% rely on family to cover college-related expenses, while 28.1% manage their expenses independently.
- 6. Student Loans: 5.7% of students have taken out loans for education, affecting their ability to manage and repay due to part-time work.
- 7. Stress Levels: Approximately 67.8% experience moderate stress when balancing part-time work and academics.
- 8. Support from Institutions: 93.4% believe colleges should offer additional support for students working part-time.



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9. Time Management: 41.5% of students employ time management strategies to effectively handle both academic and part-time job commitments.

Limitations of Study:

- 1. The study is limited to scope of part-time employment affects the academic performance and financial stability of college students
- 2. The research is restricted to the college students of Navi Mumbai.
- 3. From the total Population, 123 samples are selected for the study, limitations in the response rate, affects the representativeness of the sample.
- 4. The research will not capture long-term effects of part-time employment, as it is limited to a specific time frame.
- 5. External factors like family situations, health issues, or other life events that can affect academic performance and financial stability are not considered.
- 6. Findings are limited in generalisability to other regions or educational systems.

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
